## GUIDELINES

#### **Broad Economic Policy Guidelines**

G2: "...social system reforms need to be pursued in order to promote growth and employment, while ensuring access for all to high quality, affordable and sustainable social services and benefits."

#### **Employment Guidelines**

G8: "Member States should improve the quality, accessibility, efficiency and effectiveness of health and long-term care systems, while safeguarding sustainability."




















## **EUROPEAN PILLAR OF SOCIAL RIGHTS**

#### **Healthcare**

- Everyone has the right to timely access to affordable, preventive and curative health care of good quality;
- All dimensions of health system need to be addressed with integrated approach to come to a meaningful policy decision making.



















## WHAT CAN BE DONE IN THE HOSPITAL SECTOR?

#### **Improving Financing**

Combine activity-based payments with global budgets and pay-for-performance schemes.

#### **Reducing operational costs**

Optimise purchasing strategies of medical and non-medical good.

#### Structural reforms

- Plan hospital capacities considering full health system:
   primary to highly specialised care, social care;
- Improve the deployment of eHealth;
- Measure and compare hospital performance;

- Deploy policies reducing the demand for emergency care services and divert inappropriate visits away from emergency care units;
- Consider introducing cost-sharing for inappropriate emergency care use and reduce/eliminate payments for primary care visits.
















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## HEALTHCARE IN CSR IN 2017 AND 2019

- 2017: CSRs in Healthcare for 10 EU MS: Austria, Bulgaria, Cyprus, Finland, Latvia, Lithuania, Portugal, Romania, Slovakia and Slovenia
- 2019: CSRs in Healthcare for 15 EU MS: Austria, Bulgaria, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Finland, Greece, Hungary, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Malta, Portugal, Romania, Slovakia and Slovenia
